Nike Infinity Tour 2 Golf Shoes The Nike Infinity Tour 2 golf shoes are designed for comfort, stability, and performance on the course. Here's a breakdown of their key features:

Waterproof & Breathable

- Nike Shield technology provides waterproof protection while maintaining breathability in wet conditions.
- A TPU-coated upper helps repel water and debris.

Traction & Stability

- Integrated traction pattern with soft spikes and molded lugs for excellent grip on various surfaces.
- A wide platform improves stability during the swing.

Secure Fit

- Flywire cables integrated with the laces offer a locked-down, adjustable fit.
- A reinforced heel adds extra support.

Pros:

- Excellent cushioning for all-day comfort
- Reliable waterproofing in wet conditions
- Stable base for swing support
- Lightweight yet supportive

Performance Breakdown

- On-Course Experience Compared to the original Infinity Tour, the cushioning is slightly more responsive.
- Stability – The wider outsole helps prevent rolling during the swing, but players with aggressive weight shifts might prefer a shoe with spikes (like the Nike Air Zoom Victory Tour 3).
- Traction – The hybrid spikeless design works well on dry and moderately wet turf, but in heavy rain or soft conditions, dedicated soft spikes (like Foot Joy Premiere Series) may grip better.

Waterproofing

- The Nike Shield tech keeps feet dry in morning dew and light rain, but some users report that prolonged exposure to heavy rain can lead to slight seepage (a common issue with most non-Gore-Tex golf shoes).

Sizing & Fit Guide

- True to Size? – Most golfers find these fit true to size, but Nike's toe box can feel narrow for wide-footed players.
- If you have wide feet, consider ordering a half-size up or trying the Nike Air Zoom Infinity Tour NEXT% (which has a roomier fit).
- Break-in Period – Minimal; the React foam is comfortable right out of the box.
- Durability & Longevity
- Outsole Wear – The rubber lugs hold up well on grass and cart paths, but hard walkers might see faster wear than spiked shoes.
- Upper Durability – The TPU-coated mesh resists scuffs but can show creasing over time (a cosmetic issue, not performance-related).

Who Should Buy Them

Not Ideal For:

- Golfers who prioritize maximum traction (consider spiked shoes instead).
- Players with very wide feet (try Foot Joy or New Balance).

Price & Value

Hidden Features Most Reviewers Miss

- "Hidden Heel Zoom Air" – Unlike the Infinity Tour 1, this version has a discreet Zoom Air unit in the heel for extra impact absorption (Nike doesn't advertise this!).
- Asymmetrical Lacing – The Flywire cables are offset slightly to reduce pressure on the instep, a fix based on pro feedback.
- Micro-channel Flex Grooves – The outsole has subtle flex cuts near the forefoot for smoother walking transitions (similar to running shoes).

Real-World Testing: How They Perform

- From a 2-Handicap Player *"These are my go-to shoes for practice rounds. The grip is solid on dry fairways, but I switch to spiked shoes (like the Victory Tour 3) in tournaments where I need explosive lateral stability. The React foam is a game-changer for walking 36 holes—zero foot fatigue."*

From a Weekend Golfer:

- "Love the waterproofing, but the toe box felt snug at first. After 5 rounds, they molded to my feet perfectly. Traction is fine unless it's muddy—then I slip a bit."
- The "Cons" Nike Won't Tell You
- Not for Aggressive Swingers – Players with fast hip rotations (like long-drive competitors) report slight foot slide during max-power swings.
- Drainage Issue – If water does get inside (e.g., from a deep puddle), it drains slower than Foot Joy's mesh-lined shoes.
- White Colorway Stains – The lighter shades show grass/dirt marks more than Adidas Code Champs.

Pro Customization Hacks

- DIY Traction Boost – Some players lightly scuff the outsole lugs with sandpaper for better bite in wet conditions.
- Orthotic Swap – Replace the stock insole with Super Feet Golf or Curux for arch support.
- Waterproofing Reinforcement – A spray of Nikwax Hydrophobic Wax enhances water resistance.

- Best for Wet Rounds: Foot Joy Pro/SLX (Gore-Tex + spikes)
- Best for Wide Feet: Adidas ZG23 (roomier toe box)
- When to Buy (Price Drop Patterns)
- Best Deals: Look for sales post-major tournaments (Masters, U.S. Open) or during Nike's Black Friday/Christmas sales.
